Resource 1 Introduction

You belong to a team of archaeologists who are about to dig up a mound.

The mound, know as Cronk Keeilleig, is in the disused yard of a farm


The mound lies on a slight rise about 500 metres east of the sea. To the south the ground slopes gently down to the Killane river. The river is less than half a mile away in a wide marshy valley. To the north and east the ground is flat. From the site there is a wide view over the sea, the distant mountains to the south and the plain to the north.

The mound is about 12 metres in diameter and 2 metres high. It was probably once circular, but the edges are now ragged.

Local legend says that the mound is a burial mound, and that anyone who digs into it will suffer a terrible punishment. Today no-one believes this, and the mound is such a nuisance that the farmer wants it removed.

The farmer has asked your team of archaeologists to dig up the mound before he levels the area.

Resource 3 List of finds

Note that the entire mound is made up of turves - lumps of turf (a bit like squares of instant lawn, only rougher and much thicker). These have been cut and stacked up to form the mound.

Here is a list of things found in each level.

Level 1

In the centre, a round hole, 70 cm in diameter.

Level 2

The pointed bottom of the hole, lined with packing stones.

A thin layer of burnt animal bones (of ox, horse, sheep, dog). This layer is approx. 7.5 cm deep and is spread over almost the whole of Level 2. The bones are mixed with charcoal and black earth. There is no sign of a fire.

Level 3

A skeleton, aligned north-south, lying on its back. The arms are stretched towards the sky.

Level 8

The original ground level.

In the centre is a rectangle of subsoil, aligned east-west. It measures 2.10 m x 0.7 m. Beneath the rectangle, the walls of a pit go down vertically.

Two small stones in the pit.

Two iron spear heads.

Level 11

The pit walls continue.

Thin lines of decayed wood lie horizontally across the pit

Level 12

The pit bottom, with shapes of many objects visible.






Resource 5 Burial mound photo, taken in 1946

Resource 8 Description of objects found

Skeleton

Found at Level 3.

It is of a young woman, aged between 20 and 30 years old.

At the top of her skull is a large hole, made by a heavy implement.

Turves

Each turf is more than 20 cm thick.

The turves have not been taken from the soil around the mound.

The nearest matching soil is almost 100 metres away.

More than 500 square metres of ground must have been stripped of turf to provide the turves for the mound.

Sword

Made of iron, two-edged, in bad condition.

Viking type, 10th century.

The pommel (knob at the top of the hilt) is inlaid with silver and copper wire.

It has been deliberately broken in four places.

The sword blade is in a scabbard, which is made of several layers:

• leather (on the outside) • textile (cloth) • thin wood • textile (on the inside)

Mounts, strap-end and strap-holder

Made of bronze (a mixture of copper and tin). The mounts are lying on the sword's scabbard.

They probably fixed a sling-shaped sword-holder to the sword.

The sling would go over the shoulder.

Bronze pin

Celtic type, 13.3 cm long. It has a ring head and probably fastened a cloak.

Some fragments of cloth were found nearby.

Knife

The blade is of iron. The handle was made of wood. Its total length was 18.8 cm.

It has a leather sheath, which covers the blade and half of the handle too.

Shield remains

Found just outside the coffin. The remains consist of:

- Shield boss (metal piece in the centre). It has two deep indentations, made by a sword or axe.
- Wooden bits of the main part of the shield, very decayed.
- Fragments of red, black and white paint on leather.

Three spear heads

The slender spear head is of Norwegian (Viking) type. The others show Celtic influence in their design. They once had wooden shafts (handles).


Skull

It is very decayed - there are only traces of it left.


The enamel of the teeth has survived.

The rest of the body has rotted away.






Sling mounts and suggested sling for the sword





Resource 12 Glossary

Bemused

Confused, puzzled, dazed.

Bier

A wooden frame for a dead person to lie on.

Boss

The disc at the centre of a shield. Often made of metal.

Brocade

Rich, heavy silk cloth with a raised design on it.

Byzantine

From Byzantium – the Greek name for the modern city of Istanbul.

Loin cloth

A cloth wound around a person's private parts.

Mantle

A cloak.

Mount

In this case, a metal fastening to which leather is attached. Often joins together different pieces of leather.

Pyre

Wood placed under a dead body and then set on fire.

Rivet

Metal nail - its point is hammered flat to fasten two objects together.

Sable

The shining dark brown fur of a marten (an animal living in cold northern regions. It belongs to the weasel family).

Socket

In this case, hollow part of spear head into which the spear's shaft (handle) is pushed.

Staves

Wooden sticks.

Strap-end

In this case, metal end of a strap of leather or cloth.

Subsoil

Soil below the topsoil. Topsoil is what is nearest the surface. Subsoil is less good soil lower down.

Tapestries

Large woven cloths hung on walls. They usually show pictures or rich patterns.

Turves

Thick chunks or squares of turf cut from the ground. Today very thin turves are used to make instant lawns.
