Keeping for Posterity: How can we use archives in the classroom to shed light on the past?

Much of what we know about the past comes from various meticulously kept archives. Join us at the M&S Company Archive to learn more about how archives can spark a range of interesting enquiries including for example what the M&S archive collection can tell us about the First World War. The archive contains over 70,000 items relating to the past and present of M&S. The collection is housed at the Michael Marks Building on the University of Leeds campus, where the Marks in Time exhibition is also open to the public. The exhibition tells the story of the business from market stall to global retailer.

In addition to exploring this fascinating collection, the event will offer the opportunity to get to grips with using archives in the history classroom more generally and how archive materials can be used to spark an enquiry and build pupils' understanding of the nature and different types of historical evidence.

With a keynote speech from Andrew Payne from the National Archives, plus workshop sessions offered by Caroline Bunce and Helen Chatterton from the M&S Company Archive, Anna Carter from West Yorkshire Archive Service and Ben Walsh plus refreshments sponsored by Hodder and a chance to explore the Marks in Time exhibition, this is a CPD opportunity not to be missed. 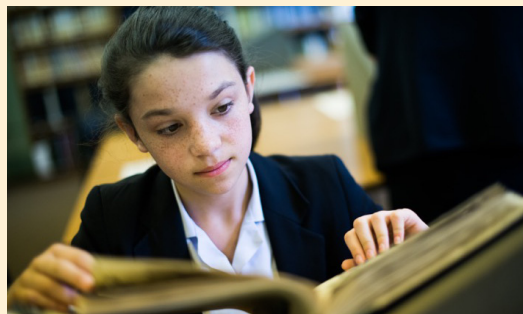
