These videos are designed to be a versatile support to learning in the classroom, and a way of bringing object based teaching and learning to you remotely. There are 4 or 5 videos of just over 2 minutes for each topic. They aim to cover a range of themes within the topic, so can be used together as a starter to a topic, or alternatively can be used separately to introduce or consolidate each theme. The videos cover history, geography and science topics. They often build on learning from previous videos in the topic.

Each week is accompanied with discussion ideas, activity ideas and additional links to resources to build on the learning introduced by the video.

There are also links to artworks, and suggestions of cross curricular links where possible.
