# How to find Woodlands Conference Centre

From the North (M6), East Lancashire (M65/61) and Greater Manchester (M61/62). M61 Junction 8 Chorley. Turn left at the roundabout adjacent to Hartwood Hall. By following the signs for Southport turn left towards Chorley (Southport Road). Woodlands is situated half a mile on the right. From the South, West Lancashire and Liverpool. M6 Junction 28 (Leyland). At the M6 exit turn right at the traffic lights. Follow the signs for Wigan (A49) for 3.5 miles to the junction of the A571, turn left Chorley (Balshaw Lane). Woodlands is situated 1.5 miles on the right. **BY BUS:** 

From Chorley buses C5, C8, C15, 109 and 347 drop directly outside Woodlands. From Euxton there is a bus link at Euxton Railway Station, No's 109, 347 and C15 drop directly outside Woodlands BY RAIL:

Railway Stations are situated at Chorley (1.5 miles) and Euxton (1.3 miles) from Woodlands. Chorley is served by local trains from Bolton, Manchester and Preston. Euxton is served by trains from Liverpool, St Helens Central, Wigan North Western, Preston, Blackpool North, Barrow and Morecambe.

### **Keynote Speakers**

### 'History: The National Perspective' – Dr Michael Maddison

Dr Michael Maddison is National Adviser for history within Ofsted and has held this post since 2008. Prior to his appointment in 2006 as one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools, he held senior leadership positions in secondary schools in North Yorkshire and Bradford. He is an experienced teacher having taught both history and politics for over 25 years. As an HMI he has extensive experience of inspecting in all phases of education. As National Adviser for history, he is responsible for leading Ofsted's curriculum and dissemination work in inspecting and reporting on history. This role involves gathering information on the state of history in schools and colleges, disseminating findings, representing Ofsted, writing reports and contributions to HMCI's Annual Report, and offering advice to HMCI, ministers and other agencies. He leads a core team of HMI and additional inspectors and together they undertake the annual programme of history inspections in schools and colleges. He is currently writing Ofsted's latest triennial report on history in primary and secondary schools in England covering the period 2007 to 2010. This report is due to be published in the spring of 2011.

### 'Finding out about the past' - Dr. Hilary Cooper

Finding out about the past will look at a series of case studies for Key Stage 1 and 2 children.

Dr. Hilary Cooper is Professor of History and Pedagogy at the University of Cumbria. She taught for many years in London Primary Schools and has published widely. Her books include *History in the Early Years*, Routledge 2002 and *History 3 - 11*, David Fulton 2006.

### 'Working with historical evidence in the classroom' – Christopher Russell & Arthur Chapman

A number of hands on activities for working with evidence will be explored including suitable activities for Year 4 and Year 6 involving artefacts and objects from a number of periods.

Christopher Russell is former primary school teacher and is now a Senior Lecturer in Education at Edge Hill University. Dr Arthur Chapman is former secondary History teacher and is now a Reader in Education at Edge Hill University and an editor of Teaching History.

### 'Dynamic digital sources' – Fiona Revell & Lindsey Johnstone

This session will explore the latest digital resources, including the local history project 'Lessons from the past'. This project has been developed with heritage lottery funding and Lostock Hall High School pupils to create an archive of accessible online resources. This website will enable teachers to allow children to independently interrogate a historical archive in an innovative and engaging way, whilst also developing their ICT and communication skills.
