# What is the IOE's Holocaust Education Development Programme (HEDP)?

The HEDP is the foremost provider of Holocaust education for teachers. The research-informed professional development programme has been designed by internationally renowned Holocaust educators. It provides practical support for teachers to help them teach about the Holocaust in a meaningful and respectful, yet historical way.
